ROBERT ROMBOUGH, TECHNICAL DIRECTOR

Robert has provided technical services for live theatre, opera, dance and events programming throughout Canada for 34 years...has been the Technical Director for Theatre Arts at the Banff Centre since 1997.

THERESA LEONARD, DIRECTOR OF AUDIO

Theresa Leonard is the director of Audio for Music & Sound at The Banff Centre. She is responsible for overseeing the internationally-known audio work study program and directing activities in the Centre's extensive audio facilities. Her work spans many aspects of audio production, postproduction, engineering, education, research, and administration. As director of the Audio program, she works closely with top industry professionals who serve as faculty members and guest lecturers for yearly seminars and workshops. She has been instrumental in assisting numerous audio program participants in obtaining key positions in the professional audio industry. Ms. Leonard holds a master's in music, specializing in sound recording, from McGill University, and holds bachelor degrees in music and in education. She has produced and engineered award-winning recordings for companies such as Anelekta, Arktos, and Bravo!, Centaur, EMI, and Marquis Records. Her research in time-delay compensation and work in audio education has been presented at Audio Engineering Society (AES) conventions and she has lectured at various universities and taken part on education panels in North America and Europe. Ms. Leonard served as AES President for the 2004/2005 year and earlier served as education chair for the Society. She chaired the 24th International AES Conference on Multichannel Audio at The Banff Centre in June 2003 and is founder of the Alberta section of the AES.

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CHRIS SEGNITZ, STUDIO MANAGER

As studio manager for Music & Sound at The Banff Centre, Chris Segnitz is responsible for the coordination of recording and production spaces as well as the workstudy participants. His role also involves the coordination and tracking of projects, both internally and externally.

After completing two diplomas at BCIT in Electronics and Broadcast Engineering, Chris began in the industry at Vancouver's famous Little Mountain Sound in 1983 as part of their technical team for their multi-room rock/pop and radio production studios. From 1988 to 2000 he fulfilled the role of audio technologist for The Banff Centre's music recording facilities, which saw the initial installation of the facilities within the Jeanne and Peter Lougheed building. During this time he also did freelance studio installations in Vancouver, Calgary, and Hawaii. From 2000-2002, he worked in Los Angeles for Solid State Logic as service engineer for their western U.S. and Mexico clients in support of their broad range of clientele. This involved technical support in the areas of music, post-production, film scoring, and broadcast. In the fall of 2002, he moved to Montreal and began work at McGill University in support of the music faculty and its recording program. Primarily, it involved him in the planning of the new research facilities and infrastructure of the Centre for Interdisciplinary Research in Music Media and Technology (CIRMMT), a new research building on McGill's Montreal campus.

Chris returned to Banff in the fall of 2004 to start in the newly created studio manager position.

SIMON GAMACHE, PRODUCTION COORDINATOR

Simon Gamache comes to Banff from the Montreal classical music label Analekta. In his position of production manager, he was responsible for overseeing all of the recording projects. He was the primary contact for all musicians, singers, producers, visual artists, writers, and manufacturers. He previously worked in the Audio/Video area for the bookstore chain Renaud-Bray. He acquired a hands-on understanding of sales, distribution and the current state of the music retail industry.

Born in Quebec City, Simon started playing the french horn in his early teenage years. Following a bachelor and a master of music in performance at McGill University, he had the chance to meet the Norwegian hornist and pedagogue Frøydis Ree Wekre during a Banff Centre summer residency. He later pursued further studies with her in Oslo. An accomplished musician, Simon has performed with numerous ensembles ranging from baroque orchestras to contemporary groups; recorded classical, jazz, pop albums and soundtracks; and has also taught music.

DAVID GLEESON, SOUND RECORDING ENGINEER

David Gleeson's career began more than 20 years ago at Decca's recording centre in Belsize Park, London. Research and development on pioneering digital recording equipment led to employment at Abbey Road Studios before David moved to California. After two years co-running the scoring stage at Skywalker Sound, David worked as chief engineer for producer/song-writer Walter Afanasieff. In 1998, he founded a post-production studio in Marin County with sound designer Ren Klyce and editor Malcolm Fife. His credits range from pop (Mariah Carey, Celine Dion) to rock (Pink Floyd, Pearl Jam), and films including *Fight Club, Panic Room, The Game*, and *The Lord of the Rings* trilogy (music oo-producer, *Fellowship* extended release, and associate music producer, *Two Towers*). He has won one Grammy Award and had several other Grammy nominations. A graduate in physics of the University of London, David has also pursued writing and editing, with two booklength projects to date.

THOMAS GEIGER, SENIOR ASSOCIATE

Senior Associate of the Audio Program, Thomas has a creative and technical education with a deep musical background. He has played the drums and cello, both classically and in rock settings since the age of six. He completed his education at the prestigious Technical/Music University Graz in Austria for audio engineering. Thomas' versatile experience in the field of sound recording and music production has earned him seven first prize awards in a plethora of international competitions. He is dedicated to audio engineering and music production and is the owner of G-tracks Studios in Germany and his own record label, Apus Records. Thomas' credits range from classical (Recreation Orchestra, Nils Frahm) and pop (Sarah Brightman) to hard rock (Saxon, Blind Guardian). He recently recorded the 13th album of legendary German metal band "Helloween" on Tenerife. He is excited to spend this fall at The Banff Centre while, in his spare time, pursuing his love of Hungarian cuisine.
